COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to serve as a capstone course for seniors who emphasize Integrated Media Arts in their POE. Students are expected to examine design theory and research methods relevant to a topic, theme, issue, or problem that has served as an area of special interest. This course is intended to allow students to develop, compose, organize, revise, and edit their own writing. Through written assignments students will have the opportunity to produce a thesis or creative project. Students must have senior standing and have a POE in IMA (designated or individualized). Distinction may be achieved if the candidate meets the IMA Distinction requirements.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be able to:

- Organize and present evidence related to visual communication design themes and topics.
- Identify credible research scholars, organizations, and institutions who produce and/or publish new scholarly information or historical data about a research topic.
- Understand a research topic thoroughly through analysis.
- Formulate questions for research based on information gaps through thorough examination of the topic of interest.
- Be prepared to contribute to the scholarly conversation through a thesis or creative project at an appropriate level (online publication, research journal, conference presentation) with new data relevant to the time, place, and culture we are living and researching within.

COURSE FORMAT/PLATFORMS/RESOURCES Slack + Google Drive + Moodle

This semester we will collaborate in person in addition to virtually. Lectures, discussions, work sessions, and critiques will take place both in person and through Zoom. Slack will be utilized for digital collaboration, peer review and feedback outside of class time. Moodle and Google Drive will be utilized for shared readings and assignment submissions. Final assignments will be submitted through Moodle.

ENGAGEMENT POLICY

In our HyFlex environment this semester you have the option to attend class in person, through Zoom synchronously, or through Zoom asynchronous by watching recorded sessions. I hope you are able to regularly engage with this course because learning often happens through our interactions with others. Engagement can take a lot of different forms depending on your circumstances and I will offer varying options for you to engage through Zoom, Slack, and Moodle submissions. Moodle will be the host of all Zoom recordings links. Each recording will be posted with the date of the class. You may use the Activity Completion feature in Moodle to check the Zoom recordings that you have either participated in by attending live or that you have watched at a later time. The base rule is that you need to engage every week in some form, but you can miss the equivalent of one week of class with no effect to your grade. If you need to miss more than that, let me know as soon as possible so we can make arrangements for you to learn the class material outside of that week.

ASSIGNMENTS

Thesis Research Paper

The candidate will prepare a thesis or creative project. The research and writing conducted in IM496 will directly influence the work completed in IM497. The research paper is expected to be a summation of the IMA research courses in addition to IMA Practicum or Internship experiences. A preliminary version of the thesis should be completed before spring break.

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Creative Project

Design and execute a creative project that is influenced by the research conducted in IM496. Consider final outcomes to showcase the creative project including but not limited to a film premiere, gallery exhibition, or other public display.

Public Presentation or Exhibition (LAS)

Present your thesis research or creative project in a public setting. Consider the research and choose the best display option based on the materials, audience, and proposed outcome. The final public display will be promoted and marketed professionally by the research student with support of the IMA Program and Juniata College.

Thesis Research Defense (FINALS WEEK)

The candidate will present and defend the results of the thesis in a private lecture on or prior to the last day of classes for approval of the faculty and professional mentors.

DISTINCTION

The faculty mentors will meet at the end of the spring semester to review the candidates' performance and decide upon recommendations for distinction in the POE. Please see the Distinction in the IMA POE requirements on the final page of the syllabus.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

External Hard Drive or Cloud Storage (preferred): Recommended minimum of 2TB of free disc space – It is your responsibility to back up your work and keep all files organized outside of your Juniata drives/desktop computers. Saving work on the computers in the classroom is not a professional option as the files may be lost and unable to be retrieved.

UN-GRADING POLICY

You may notice that the assignments listed above have no points or percentages. That is because we are working in an agency setting and focusing on mastering design skills. To do this we will complete a project, critique that project, revise the project, and resubmit with suggested changes and a reflection. The work that is submitted at the end of the semester will be portfolio ready.

How ungrading works:

- Students will complete projects to the best of their ability, and adhere to all project objectives, submission requirements, and deadlines.
- For each DRAFT submission, the following class time will be dedicated to receiving feedback from both peers and professor
- Each FINAL submission will be a revised version of the draft submitted prior to receiving feedback. Students will take into consideration what their peers/professor said about their work, and add elements to their project based on these suggestions.
- The goal is to evolve design skills through collaboration, and the willingness to consider multiple perspectives on a project, while also achieving an expected final product.
- A key component of un-grading is student reflection. When a student submits their final work a short paragraph is required in Moodle in the comment section. This will allow students to reflect on how their design skills are evolving due to collaboration with others.

Distinction in the POE INTEGRATED MEDIA ARTS

A. Eligibility

- 1. Students will be invited to undertake a senior project, in addition to the required courses in the field including IMA Practicum or IMA Internship.
- 2. An invitation would be extended by the middle of the junior year, to exceptionally strong students. Invited students will already have completed at least 40 credits towards their POE core requirements.
- 3. Invited students will be expected to have maintained a grade-point average of 3.5 within the POE, and 3.0 overall.
- 4. Invitations may also be issued to students with interdisciplinary POEs when this POE has a substantial IMA component. This will be at the discretion of the faculty overseeing IMA Distinction.
- 5. The invitation to attempt to earn distinction in the POE is just that. <u>The student is not guaranteed distinction merely</u> by virtue of receiving such an invitation.

B. Organization

Integrated Media Arts Seminar (IM 496) 3 credits

In the fall semester of the senior year (junior year under necessary circumstances), the candidate will select, in consultation with their research advisors a topic to investigate further. Students will develop a research agenda including but not limited to research bibliography, reflective reading responses, artist statement, research abstract, in addition to a research proposal.

Integrated Media Arts Research (IM 497) 3 credits

In the spring semester, the candidate will prepare a thesis or creative project. The research and writing conducted in IM496 will directly influence the work completed in IM497.

Research Advisor

The candidate will select a member of the IMA faculty as a research advisor. This faculty member will be responsible for guiding the student through the research described below.

Thesis OR Creative Project

A thesis OR creative project will be executed in IM497. The thesis is expected to be a summation of the IMA research courses (IM496 & IM497) in addition to influence from practicum or internship experiences over the last two years. If a creative project is chosen original design materials will be proposed and developed.

Presentation or Exhibition

A public presentation is required. Based on the student's research and deliverables, the student and faculty research advisor will identify the proper final display.

C. Evaluation

- 1. At least two relevant mentors must be identified by the candidate to review the thesis and project in addition to identify final presentation setting: a public presentation or exhibit prior to the last day of classes. The mentor team should include one IMA Faculty member and the second mentor can be faculty, staff, or an industry professional.
- 2. The candidate will present and defend the results of the thesis in a private lecture on or prior to the last day of classes for approval of the faculty mentors.
- 3. The faculty and professional mentors will meet at the end of the spring semester to review the candidates' performance and decide upon recommendations for distinction in the POE.
